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Who we are

The archipelago of Madeira is a Portuguese archipelago consisting of four groups of islands: Madeira, Porto Santo, Desertas and Selvagens. Its total area is 801 km² (309 mi²).

Madeira and Porto Santo are the two main islands and the only ones with inhabitants. Approximately 251,000 people live here. The Desertas and Selvagens islands are nature reserves and are the refuge of multiple species of fauna and flora. Visits to these islands require prior authorization.



Where we are

The archipelago of Madeira is located in the North Atlantic, on the African tectonic plate.

It is approximately 1000 km (620 miles) from mainland Europe (about 1h30 by plane from Lisbon) and 700 km (435 miles) from the African coast.



How to get there

Cristiano Ronaldo International Airport, named after the Madeiran soccer player, is the arrival point for most visitors to the archipelago of Madeira. The frequent, daily direct flights to the main European airports and many more to the rest of the world, on a weekly basis, make visiting Madeira increasingly faster and easier.

Traveling to Madeira is, most of the time, a short trip from anywhere in Europe, making the Region an ideal destination for both short breaks and long stays.

Another large slice of the tourists who visit Madeira arrives by sea. Dozens of cruise ships dock at the port of Funchal every week. It is not uncommon, therefore, for some of the largest passenger ships in the world to anchor in Funchal, thus placing Madeira in their stopovers throughout the year.

It is also possible to visit the archipelago of Madeira by landing directly in Porto Santo. The golden island has an airport that, in addition to flights from Madeira and the mainland, receives charter flights from several European countries throughout the year.



Climate

The archipelago of Madeira certainly has one of the most pleasant climates in all of Europe.

The monthly temperature varies very little throughout the year. The archipelago of Madeira certainly has one of the most pleasant climates in all of Europe.

In Funchal - the archipelago's capital - the temperature rarely drops below 17°C (63°F) in the winter (in February) and rarely exceeds 25°C (77°F) in the summer (in August).

However, all over the island one comes across microclimates. The large mountains and the air currents that blow in from various directions make for a different climate in each area of the archipelago. As a rule, the south is the hottest part of the island. As we go north, the temperature drops, and in the interior of the island, in the higher-altitude areas, the temperatures gradually drop, and precipitation is more frequent here...

It is possible, therefore, that in a short walk around the island, you will experience the feeling of having lived through all four seasons in a single day.



Safety

Madeira is a safe destination, ideal for a family vacation (also with children and babies), or among friends. Nothing is too far off and you can experience quite a lot in just a few days. The tranquility is ideal for those who want to relax and escape from the daily routine. With a very low crime rate, a vacation in the archipelago is synonymous with peace and quiet for both body and mind.

There are many accommodation options in Madeira. Whether you stay at a beachfront resort, a boutique hotel in the center of Funchal, a local accommodation house in a rural area, or one of Madeira's traditional *quintas* (estates), traveling to Madeira is sure to provide you with great service.

All the Sea



Sea

When viewed from the archipelago, the horizon seems endless, making it difficult to distinguish where the sea ends and the sky begins. An idyllic setting that brings a sense of serenity and tranquility that few other places can offer.

The moments of bonding with nature provide an opportunity to experience firsthand the beauty, the peace, and the power of the Atlantic Ocean, which, all along the coast, has created pebble beaches - eternal points of interaction with the sea that the Madeirans have learned to master.

The average temperature of the sea water in the archipelago of Madeira is relatively high and varies regularly throughout the year between about 17°C (63°F) in March, and 22°C (72°F) in August and September. These temperatures make the islands ideal places, not only to go swimming, all year round, but also to enjoy a great diversity of water sports.



Madeira's Beaches

Along the Madeiran coastline you can find a great diversity of beaches. Madeira's beaches are known for their pebbles.

From north to south of the island there are many beaches that remain without any human intervention.

Unexplored corners make up scenarios of unspoiled natural beauty, ideal for those who value peace and quiet and the tranquility of being almost alone with the elements.

Meanwhile, the bathing complexes that can be found in practically every municipality are an excellent option for those who want to swim in Madeira's crystal-clear blue sea. Enjoy the comfort of stretching out your towel on a comfortable sun lounger, and have at your disposal some amenities, such as bar service, changing rooms, and good accessibility to the sea.

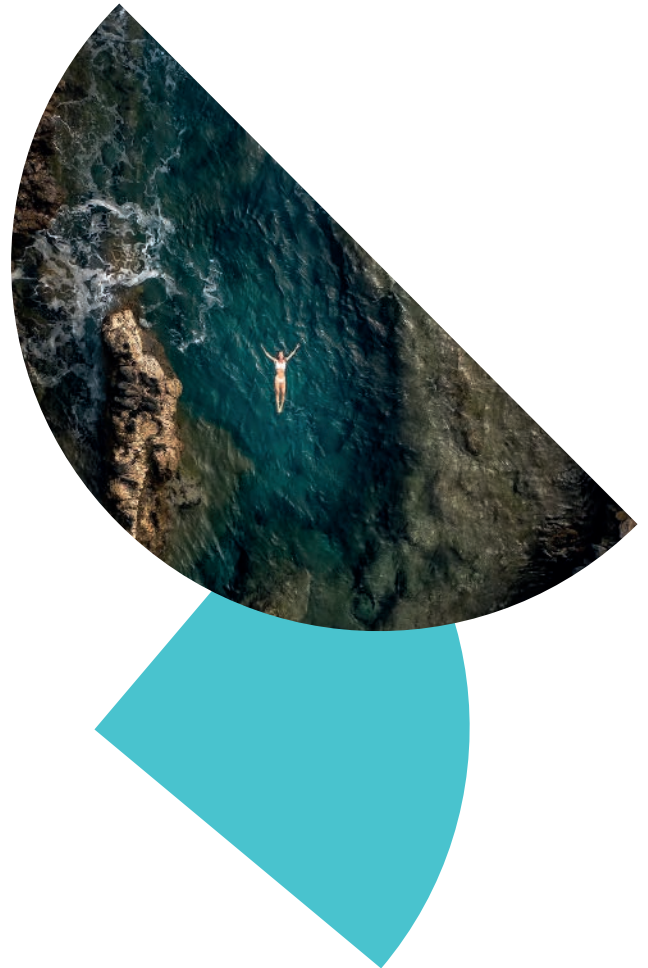
Less common, and therefore very desirable, are the sandy beaches. Black, coppery, or yellow – imported from paradise destinations – when it comes to choosing where to go bathing, sandy beaches are the preference of many families and vacationers.



Natural volcanic pools

The natural pools of Porto Moniz and Seixal are saltwater pools that, framed by volcanic rock, are naturally fed by the sea. Located on Madeira's northern coast, these pools are considered one of the island's natural treasures. The green landscape of the mountains and the sea water renewing itself cyclically in the volcanic rocks, combine the earth and water elements in an idyllic perfection.

Also on the southern coast of Madeira, we find traces of this type of natural volcanic contribution. In Funchal, at the bathing area of Poças do Gomes/Doca do Cavacas, it is possible to swim in pools naturally formed by volcanic activity, and at the same time contemplate the incredible and imposing image of Cabo Girão - the highest headland in Europe, at 580 meters.

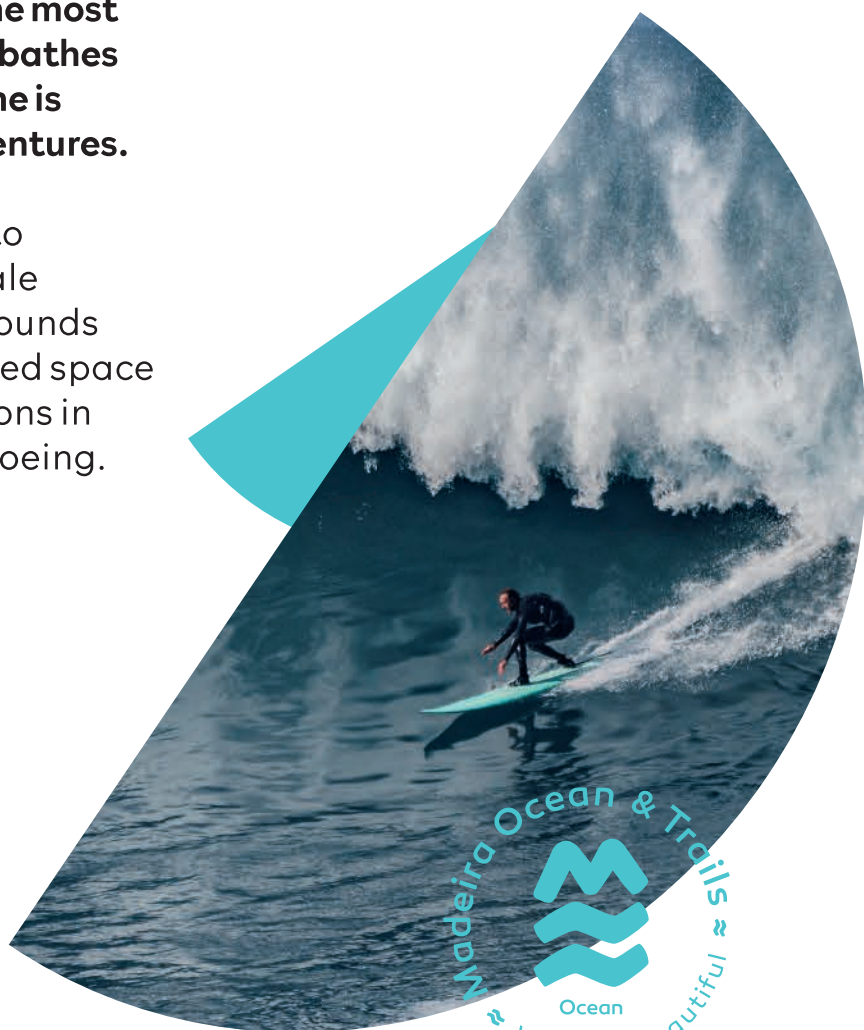


Active tourism and water sports

All the Nature



Nature

Laurissilva Forest



Laurissilva is the indigenous forest of Madeira with humid subtropical features and occupies 20% of the island's total area.

It was declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1999, and touring it is one of the highlights of any trip to the archipelago. It consists mainly of evergreen trees and shrubs, especially the *til*, the *vinhático* (timber trees), the laurel, and the *barbusano* (canary laurel) - all from the Lauraceae family.

Madeira Nature Park

The Madeira Nature Park is a biogenetic reserve that incorporates, all throughout its extension, a unique flora and fauna.

Officially established in 1982, this protected area occupies 2/3 of the island's territory and includes all of its municipalities, from east to west, more significantly in the center and north coast of the region. The best way to explore it is by using the network of recommended routes, and allowing yourself to be surprised by the incredible natural scenery that will unfold before you.



Levadas

Levadas are irrigation channels created to direct water from the northern slopes of the island, where, due to rainfall, it is more abundant, to the south. An engineering project developed by the Madeirans, over several centuries and successive generations, the network of levadas is about 1400 km (870 miles) long. To walk these trails is to be rewarded by landscapes of immaculate authenticity, witnessing the ancestral power of a nature evolved over thousands of years.

Viewpoints

From busy cosmopolitan life to tropical nature, the viewpoints built throughout the region offer unparalleled and memorable panoramic landscapes. These landscapes are marked by the unavoidable presence of the sea and the vegetation, which adds green tones to practically every corner.



Funchal for all



Funchal

Funchal is the capital of Madeira Island and is located in a bay on the southern coast of the island. A bustling, cosmopolitan place, it shines resplendent from the natural amphitheatre where it rests, surrounded by mountains and valleys. The perfect balance between nature and urban planning, to walk around Funchal is to collect unique experiences.

About 100,000 people live in the ten parishes that make up the Municipality of Funchal, which has an area of approximately 77 km² (30 mi.²) 77 km².



Mercado dos Lavradores (Farmers' Market)

One of the landmarks of Madeira's capital is a place where colors, aromas, and tradition come together to delight and amaze visitors in a truly incomparable experience.

Located in the historical area of Funchal, the Mercado dos Lavradores was inaugurated in 1940 and, for many years, was the main supply hub for the region.

Nowadays, it remains the choice of many Madeirans when it comes to buying the most exotic fruits as well as fish and seafood, which arrive fresh to the market every day.

Basket Sledges

In Madeira, fun is literally around the corner. When you go up to the parish of Monte, you get to know one of Madeira's most famous attractions. The basket sledges are a very original form of transportation, in a tradition that dates back to the 19th century. Nowadays they are a must for those who want to relive part of the once common way of getting from Monte to downtown Funchal.

Old Town of Funchal

It is believed that this was the first area of the city to be populated. Since the implementation of the "Arte das Portas Abertas" project (Painted Doors) in 2010, the influx of people has multiplied and this part of the city has become one of the main gastronomic and entertainment spots in Funchal.

Entertainment

In Funchal, entertainment takes to the streets all year round. The mild weather means that many of the parties and events can be held outdoors without major constraints. The calendar of celebrations offers local people and visitors plenty of reasons to celebrate and toast together. Also the plethora of bars, discos, rooftops, and restaurants bring a unique liveliness to Funchal.

Heritage and Culture



Heritage and Culture

With over 600 years of history, the archipelago of Madeira is proud to be the guardian of a vast collection of monuments, religious temples, museums, and other cultural spaces. Madeira's cultural heritage stands out, therefore, for its diversity and, of course, for its undeniable historical relevance.

History

It was the year 1419 when the island of Madeira was put on the map by Portuguese navigators, one year after they had named the island of Porto Santo.

The colonization process of the archipelago begins, then, in 1425. Over the following centuries, Madeira's history is unmistakably outlined, firstly, by sugar cane cultivation, then by the export of Madeira Wine. As early as the 19th century, part of the European aristocracy, attracted by the therapeutic properties of the archipelago, began to take up temporary residence here.

Madeira blossomed for tourism, a sector that still today marks its daily pulse.



Monuments and Architecture

Madeira's heritage includes buildings from different historical periods and architectural styles that range from Baroque to Manueline, Gothic, Rococo, and Mannerist. The churches in Madeira are probably among the best examples, standing out not only for their relevant architecture, but also for their rich and elaborate interiors.

Visit, for example, the Funchal Cathedral and the Colégio Church, but also look out for the palaces, forts, and museums scattered around the archipelago.

Gardens and Parks

Madeira is also famous for the beauty of its gardens and parks. Century-old trees, peculiar plants, and flowers of exuberant colors decorate both the gardens of municipal spaces and charming Madeiran manor houses, some of which are open to the public.

Botanical and tropical gardens have seduced locals and visitors for decades and provide a meeting ground with nature, even in more cosmopolitan environments.

Madeira Embroidery

With a centuries-old history, Madeira Embroidery is synonymous with excellence, tradition, thoroughness, art, and identity. It is one of the hallmarks of this Atlantic archipelago, whose origin dates back to the beginning of its settlement process, in the 15th century.



Porto Santo



Porto Santo

Porto Santo is the second largest island in the Madeira archipelago and, other than Madeira, is the only inhabited island in the archipelago. In 2020 it earned the status of a UNESCO Biosphere Reserve, and the entire surface of the island and surrounding marine area is protected under this distinction.

Living up to its name, Porto Santo is a sacred hideaway for all who visit. This paradise, located just 50 km (32 miles) from the island of Madeira, is known for its long, beautiful stretch of golden yellow sand taking up virtually the island's entire southern coast.

Relaxation is guaranteed in its 9 km (5.5 mi.) of generous beach that, in 2022, was elected by the European Best Destinations as the best beach in Europe. However, Porto Santo has much more to offer. Peaks and trails invite you to take a walk in Nature, and the sea, slightly undulating, is ideal for water activities such as windsurfing. Porto Santo's gastronomic offer deserves its own chapter.

With an airport that receives daily flights from several European countries, and a port that opens every day to receive a ferry from Funchal, connecting the two islands, Porto Santo is the ideal hideaway, accessible to all, and a destination worth visiting on its own, or combined with the island of Madeira.



The Sandy Beach



The sand from Porto Santo is carbonated and biogenic, possessing physical, chemical and thermal properties that have proven successful in naturopathy treatments. Together with the sea that bathes its coast, the high content of iodine, calcium, and magnesium help to deal with the lack of mineral salts.

For two centuries, the sands of Porto Santo have been used to treat rheumatic, physiatriic, and orthopedic diseases. In this regard, Porto Santo is also considered a destination associated with wellness and well-being, and a stay on the golden island is ideal for connecting the body and the senses.

Active Tourism



The island of Porto Santo offers the possibility of engaging in a wide variety of activities and sports, in harmony with Nature. On land, there are walks along incredible trails, excursions to steep peaks, 4x4 rides, and whether you're an amateur or professional golfer, the Porto Santo Golf Course is an oasis for golf lovers. The sea around Porto Santo is perfect for whale watching, diving and snorkeling, and for activities such as surfing, windsurfing, and stand-up paddle. Its mild temperature makes it possible to step into the sea without hesitation all year round.

Events



Unforgettable Events



Madeira proudly presents a calendar of events with activities that take place all year round and cover a wide variety of topics. Cultural, traditional, sporting, or in honor of Nature, these events are planned so that those who visit the archipelago take home memories of a people in celebration.

Carnival

In Madeira, Carnival is celebrated over the course of two weeks of festivities, because a shorter duration would not fit all the activities that, over the years, have been established as tradition, and have served to build the reputation of "great revelers" that Madeirans bear with great pride. A major contribution to this is the Great Parade 'Cortejo Alegórico', which takes place on the Saturday before Shrove Tuesday and transforms Funchal's main avenues into a Madeiran sambodrome. Music, choreography, glitter, and sass lend glamor to a night that extends through the streets and nightspots of the region.

Flower Festival

The celebration of spring and nature is one of Madeira's main tourist attractions.

The archipelago is turned into a stage that sees beautiful floral carpets spread across its floors and a lot of animation along its avenues, in the form of musical concerts, shows, fashion shows, and classic car exhibitions, among others. The highlight of this festivity is, however, the 'Cortejo Alegórico da Flor' (Allegoric Flower Parade), which crosses the main avenues of Funchal with dozens of floats, adorned with the beautiful Madeiran flowers, while thousands of participants, especially children, parade to the sound of joyful symphonies, wearing beautiful costumes, also representing the flower.



Atlantic Festival

The Atlantic Festival heralds the beginning of summer in the archipelago of Madeira.

During the month of June there are several cultural initiatives that take place outdoors. It is within this context that the Regional Arts Week takes place and that Portugal's oldest World Music festival is also taking place: 'Raízes do Atlântico'. However, the highlight of this celebration is the pyromusical shows that take place over the four Saturdays of the month, organized by different guest countries.

The combination of music and fireworks makes for an unforgettable experience for all those who gather in downtown Funchal to watch this magical moment up close.

Wine Festival

The end of summer is celebrated in Madeira with the Wine Festival. An event that celebrates not only the wine itself, but also the grapes and the harvest.

Over the course of two weeks, the festivities will take place on the avenues of Funchal, where wine tastings will be held and allusive spaces and even a Wine Lounge will be set up. The activities arising from the Wine Festival invite tourists and Madeirans to participate in the harvest process, from the picking of the grapes to the treading of the grapes. A festivity that, naturally, also exalts the famous Madeira Wine.

Columbus Festival

The Columbus Festival is held on the island of Porto Santo in September and marks the passage of the navigator Christopher Columbus through the island, where he lived from 1478 to 1480.

Every year, Porto Santo embraces this tradition and embarks on a faithful reenactment of medieval daily life. The festival features dramatizations, skits, acrobatics, and juggling, with entertainment being a constant in the city's streets.

This festival is a little trip back in time that is worth experiencing, while enjoying so many other reasons that bring so many tourists to this golden paradise every year.

Nature Festival

This event on the tourist calendar aims to promote tourist entertainment as part of Nature, encouraging the enjoyment of sports activities in direct contact with Madeira's natural heritage.

Over the course of a week, in the center of Funchal, there will be demonstrations of activities that can be performed both in nature and at sea, promoting some of the sports that benefit most from the region's natural surroundings. From hiking to diving, from canoeing to mountain biking, Madeira celebrates its status as one of today's top destinations for active tourism.

Christmas and New Year

The month of December in Madeira is marked by Christmas – the favorite celebration of all Madeirans – and is even nicknamed "The Party".

Thousands of multicolored bulbs light up and brighten the streets outside in all of Madeira's parishes, in a show of light and color that can only be compared to the joy that Madeirans and tourists show on their faces at this time of year.

In Funchal, the very center of the Christmas festivities, gastronomic tastings take place and animation runs through the city's avenues and squares, contributing to a constant atmosphere of fun, culture, and Christmas spirit. The authenticity of the Madeiran Christmas earned it a place among the Best Christmas Markets in Europe in 2022, by the European Best Destinations. Come New Year's Eve and the first few minutes of January, we are treated to a display of light and color that has already made history in the Guinness World Records as the largest pyrotechnic show in the world and that, every year, helps us enter the New Year with beauty and hope.





Awards and distinctions

Awards and distinctions

The islands of the Madeira archipelago have received several distinctions over the years, both at national and international level, placing the archipelago at the top of the world tourist destinations.

Madeira has consecutively won the World's Leading Island Destination from the World Travel Awards since 2015 and also received the Europe's Leading Island Destination award from the same entity in 2013, 2014, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020, 2021.

Other high-profile accolades include the award given by the World Golf Awards in 2019, which chose Madeira as the World's Best Emerging Golf Destination.

The Guinness World Records awarded Madeira the distinction of the Largest Pyrotechnic Show in the World, for the 2006/2007 fireworks show.

Since 2020, the Madeira Christmas Market has been featured in the European top 10.

According to the Best European Destinations, two out of the three best beaches in Europe are in Madeira, namely Porto Santo and Seixal.

For its concern with the planet's sustainability and following the implementation of measures in that regard, the Autonomous Region of Madeira was awarded the silver level distinction for "Sustainable Tourism Destination" by EarthCheck in 2023.

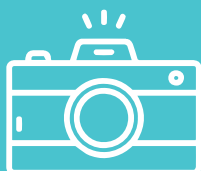
